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

School street for the North Conference



Context 1700 pupils – 3 exits from school

- Ongoing concerns raised by local residents regarding Kettlethorpe Hall Drive
- Only 6 visitor parking spaces
- Highly inclusive school





A School Street was introduced on Kettlethorpe Hall Drive on 30th September 2021

This was for a trial period of up to 18 months under an Experimental Traffic Regulation Order (ETRO). The experimental traffic regulation order restricts vehicles from driving on the school street between 08:20 - 09:00 and 14:45 - 15:30, to encourage more children and young people to walk, cycle and scoot to school. Residents, and people with mobility issues were issued with a permit to allow access to the school street at the restricted times. Road closed signs were placed on Kettlethorpe Hall Drive for the launch of the school street to remind parents of the restriction.



Cllr George Ayre attended the launch alongside West Yorkshire Police school staff and the council.

 Pupils were encouraged to cycle to school and try out the new bike sheds on launch day with every cyclist being offered a free breakfast. A security bike registration scheme was promoted to students who cycled to school.

Engaging for effective School Streets

- Experimental Traffic Regulation Order creates a pedestrian and cycle zone (with exemptions) around school
- No barriers, stewards (paid or unpaid), or cameras
- "Behaviour change intensive" School Streets
- Permits allow access for staff, residents, families, and users of other trip generators who need them
- Enforceable by police



Reasons not to deliver a School Street at Hotspur Primary



Other trip generators

Community centre needing access at all times, particularly 9am for their sessions for adults with disabilities – lots of carers and blue badge holders. One of the roads used as parking for a nearby council depot.

Too many closure points

Especially for a 'signage only' scheme

Large travel area and high SEN provision

Lots of families drive in or have supported travel

Transitory residents

High student population, difficult to communicate on a long term basis



Pilot scheme

Already doubts about the scheme working – this would be a very tricky site to pilot it at

Reluctant school

...to start with!

No parking

No clear space for e.g. Park and Stride

Lots of residents

Permit needed for access – dense housing with multiple streets affected





1. School Streets in Leeds

• Phase 1 – June 2020 - 6 schools

• Phase 2 – September 2020 - 8 schools

• Phase 3 – September 2023 - 3 schools

• Phase 4 – Summer 2024 - 2 schools

Live School Streets

 An evaluation of the School Street trial (Phases 1&2) was undertaken by Living Streets during 2022



2. Site Selection

- Initial phases through Expressions of Interest
- Some schools approached through favourable locations or via other tip offs
- Following the initial trial (Phase 1 and Phase 2) an evaluation was undertaken of which a Selection Criteria was recommended for future sites
- Schools are now asked to complete the Stage 1 assessment themselves and agree in principle to MoU etc
- Stage 2 and Stage 3 assessments are carried out by council officers




Figure 18: Stage 1 - School Self-Assessment







3. Consultation & Engagement

- School staff meetings with senior leadership teams (inc governors) to explain how School Streets work and obligations of the school, council and other partners (Memorandum of Understanding)
- Local Councillors are consulted on the proposal and consultation areas. They are also invited to highlight any particular focus groups, action groups to include within the consultation.
- Residents and businesses on the School Street and neighbouring streets where displaced parking is likely to occur are consulted on the proposals.
- Through the School channels, such as letters, text messages, apps and websites parents/carers are also consulted

4. Traffic and Parking Surveys



- Traffic Surveys are undertaken to provide quantitative data on the existing situation, while also providing a baseline for future evaluation of the school street
- Traffic Surveys run for at least a week during term time and non term time.
- Volume, Speed, Vehicle Classification
- Parking beat surveys are carried out on the proposed School Street and surrounding streets
- These provide parking capacity and utilisation data to understand and forecast potential displacement

TRANSFORMING TRAVEL

5. Implementation:

- Prior to the launch of the School Street, LCC staff deliver an all school assembly to explain the School Street
- As part of the School pack a series of suggested comms is provided to the school to circulate to their parents and guardians
- Connecting Leeds, LCCs comms brand lead on press releases, and social media publications

Launch Weeks

- LCC Road Safety trainers deliver scooter and/or pedestrian playground sessions
- LCC staff support stewarding the School Street, engaging and education road users
- LCC staff will mentor and provide on site training to school staff who will act as stewards

Stewards

- Essential to success, provide ongoing reminder of the restrictions
- Clear guidance on dos and don'ts:
 - · Do not direct traffic
 - Do not engage in confrontation

6a Enforcement

- As a moving Traffic Offence historically only the Police can enforce
 - WYP using offence code RR84171 = Vehicle Contravene local traffic order other than parking
- Part 6 powers allow Local Authorities to enforce these
- Leeds City Council has recently had approval of these powers to enforce Cycle and Pedestrian zones (School Streets) among others
 - · Cost implications
 - Fixed cameras implemented in <u>Shropshire</u> cost £31,000 per camera
 - LCC operates a mobile camera vehicle however further modifications are required
 - Current approximate costs are £40K
 - Not achievable against current costs of £24,000 to install a School Street
 - There may be scope to deliver this across the district – West Yorkshire, to deliver economies of scale





6b Temporary Retractable Barriers

- Recent approval to trial retractable Barriers
- Easily moved physical barriers across the carriageway
- To be trialled at 3 Schools
- Requires additional training (delivered by LA)
- Follows extensive discussion with other local authorities operating school streets
- To encourage compliance while alternative enforcement powers are brought forward

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
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
